CONTEXT

Over recent years, numerous strategies have made the compelling case for how arts and culture can help reimagine our towns, high streets, and also strengthen community ties.

This has been reflected in government initiatives.
The Community Renewal Fund, Levelling Up Fund
White Paper and UK Shared Prosperity Fund all
highlight the role of culture and heritage initiatives in
post pandemic recovery and step-change in places.

The influence is evident in Arts Council's 10-year strategy (Let's Create), for how arts and culture can also play a key role in addressing local challenges, strengthening community ties and encouraging more inclusive and cleaner versions of growth.

These themes continue to be explored in the recent Culture & Place in Britain report (ACE & Key Cities – Feb 2023.) The report advocates that culture needs to be positioned at the heart of a renewed drive for hyperlocal devolution to empower communities and drive local growth.

For this extended roundtable discussion, we will bring together contributors from the arts, creative practitioners, cultural organisations, academics, policy makers, strategists and thought leaders to consider:

- How best do we mobilise culture for regeneration and recovery
- How do we reimagine places in a responsible and sustainable way
- How do we engage and include under-served communities
- What support is needed to best facilitate ongoing engagement
- Who are the additional stakeholders, brokers and actors who need who need to be involved
- What would the infrastructure or framework look like to support step change in places
- How we consider Cultural Memory & Communal Significance in how we encourage a more inclusive approach to projects

This session will also crucially explore the potential of events such as the National Festival of Making and the role of all stakeholders in an ecology that is needed to sustain effective interventions and influence system design that embeds support for people and communities, creating opportunities to trial new approaches and innovative ideas at the local level.

Ibukan is one of the selected artists that will be exhibiting at the National Festival of Making this year as part of the associated Art in Manufacturing programme.


